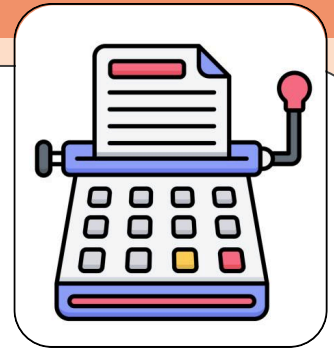

01. CART Captioning

Communication Access Realtime Translation (CART) Captioning is a service that will allow you to have your class or lecture translated into written text in real time. You have the option of being paired with an in-person captioner or a captioner can stream into your class via a video conferencing tool (Zoom, WebEx, etc.). For both options, the captioner will transcribe the speaker's spoken words into written text. The written text will then be transferred to a tablet, mobile device, or laptop where you will have access to it. You can find CART captioners via many companies online such as Caption First, Deaf Services Unlimited, or reaching out to your school's center for students with disabilities to see if they can connect you with a captioner.



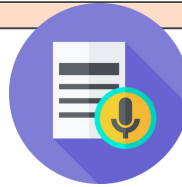

02. Transcription Apps

Transcription apps are an alternative for captioning that does not require another person. There are many free options that will translate speech into text in real time via an easily accessible mobile app. Your school may also be able to provide you a service. These can be used easily and discreetly by simply placing your device on your desk in the direction of the speaker.

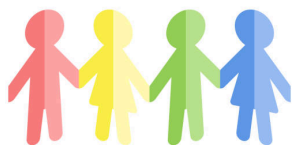
04. Remote Microphones

If your goal is to hear lectures and events more clearly, remote microphones may be a great option for you! A remote microphone is a small device that connects directly to your hearing devices.
